HIGHLIGHTS 2023

Since Lead-Up began doing workshops in 2015 we have reached over **670 youths in 10 different countries** through **66 workshops**.

IN 2023 ALONE WE HAVE...

Successfuly completed our first UN sponsored grant project.

Reached 76 young people in Guatemala.

Worked directly with **over 60 family and community members in Guatemala**, to increase understanding, cooperation and reconciliation.

Offered over **120 individual psychosocial support sessions** to young people and their families

Provided mentoring and funding for the development of **2** youth-led community projects in Guatemala.

Carried out **11 Discovering Non-Violence workshops** in 4 countries across 4 continents with over a **110 young people.**

Expanded our international partnerships to ensure sustainability and growth with 2 new partnersips in the UK and 2 new partnerships in South Africa.

PROGRAMMING PRINCIPLES AND APPROACHES

Lead-Up International's approaches, programs and projects are focused on Positive Youth Development and the interruption, through formative experiences, of patterns of violence and poverty. With a Youth-led Approach rooted in Community Empowerment, Capacity Building and Mentorship, Lead-Up seeks to ensure the effectiveness and sustainability of our actions.

Our youth led-approach prioritizes the youths' needs, interests, and perspectives which is achieved through their active involvement in planning, decision-making and efforts to improve our programs, initiatives and activities.



Lead-Up utilizes a trauma informed approach that realizes the widespread impact of trauma and understands potential paths for recovery, recognizes the signs and symptoms of trauma in beneficiaries, families, staff and others; resists re-traumatization and responds by fully integrating knowledge about trauma into policies, procedures, practices and settings.

All Lead-Up programs in Guatemala are supported by a certified psychologist and all activities carried out by the organization are based on the principles of trauma informed approach, namely:

- · Security.
- Trustworthiness and transparency.
- · Peer support.
- Collaboration and mutuality.
 Empowerment, voice and choice.
- Cultural, historical and gender issues



OUR PROGRAMS

Three Evolving Programs Shaped by Youth

This year we continued to fine tune our programs with the feedback of our young participants.



Discovering Non-Violence

Based on the feedback of participating youth, this year we incorporated an introductory meeting before the discovering non-violence workshops in Guatemala, where youth met other participants, received information about the workshop and carried out the pre-workshop questionnaires.

Internationally, based on the needs of working and studying youth we adapted the workshop schedule to be able to carry out a one day version of our 2-day workshop and ensure youth participation and continuity. Similarly we have developed a series of follow-up activities and actions to reinforce the learnings and continue to support the youth in countries where our full programs are not yet available.

Embodying Peaceful Leadership

Based on youth feedback we have reinforced the selection, follow-up and support process for youth during their supervised internships, and we have adapted the M&E questionnaires to reduce the time spent on evaluations.

We also implemented role-play activities to practice the learned skills before implementing them in their everyday lives and in their internships.

Being the Change

We have begun designing a pilot program for Being the Change that diversifies our support and community engagement and incorporates the youths' need for diverse and equitable opportunities as well as more structured technical and logistic support for youth-led project and activities.



OUR PROGRAMS

The Champions Program -GUATEMALA-

The Champions' Program is an ongoing mentoring initiative in Guatemala that provides youth with follow-up **support**, access to **psychosocial services**, **mentorship**, and development **workshops**. It fosters exchange and mentorship among youths, enabling them to teach and support one another as they grow through **peer-to-peer learning**.





OUR PROGRAMS

The Champions Program -GUATEMALA-

This program supports the positve development of the young people by helping them:

- · Form strong relationships and meaningful connections.
- · Experience a sense of belonging.
- · Support one-another.
- Cultivate a positive self-image and self-esteem.
- Develop healthy coping skills to deal with hardships.
- Feel hope that things can change and improve.

IMPACT STORY



Oliver experienced a childhood marked by constant changes and a sense of instability. The ups and downs of his parents' relationship resulted in multiple separations and reconciliations, until the day finally came when his mother decided to leave. As a result, Oliver and his sister found themselves in the care of their grandmother, who took on the responsibility of looking after their welfare. He now recognizes that this was one of the hardest things he had to face, to grow up without the constant presence of his parents.





The unconditional support of his grandmother was one of the pillars that helped him grow up, he also remembers with affection the presence and example of his uncles and the excitement of seeing his father on weekends.

After a few years, Oliver made the decision to move in with his father. Although their relationship was difficult at first, everything began to change when he participated in the Lead-Up program for the first time in 2017. During that experience, Oliver formed a special bond with a horse named Bolero, who seemed to understand and reciprocate his affection by resting his head on his shoulder. That moment of deep connection allowed Oliver to let loose, express his emotions and share without fear of judgment. From that experience, his confidence to communicate and express himself with his father was strengthened, which, in turn, helped to improve their relationship.



IMPACT STORY



Oliver acknowledges that accepting the support offered to him, both in terms of psychosocial support and participation in workshops and follow-up processes, was a determining factor in his personal

growth. Without his openness and willingness to change, it would have been very difficult to repair relationships in his family environment.

Last year, Oliver rejoined the Lead-Up project after a break. In this new stage, confident in the impact that Lead-Up activities can have on the lives of young people, he participated again in workshops such as "Discovering

Non-violence", in the vocational program, in the monthly activities of the champions and finally in a community activity. Among all the valuable experiences he has had, he highlights the opportunity to meet other young people with diverse stories, which has given him new perspectives, motivation and inspiration.

IMPACT STORY

The tools and learnings he has acquired through his participation in Lead-Up, such as conscious breathing, the use of the emotional thermometer, emotional management and self-awareness about

the areas he needs to improve, have been fundamental in his daily life. These tools have not only positively impacted his relationship with his

family, but have also influenced his studies and professional performance




